



New MBS items (45534 and 45535) for autologous fat grafting for the breast

Last updated: 22 September 2021

- From 1 November 2021, new Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS) items will be created for autologous fat grafting by injection for defects arising from breast surgery, breast cancer treatment or prevention and congenital breast deformity.
- This change is relevant for general surgeons and plastic and reconstructive surgeons.
- Patients will gain access to MBS rebates for this new service.

What are the changes?

From 1 November 2021 two new MBS items will commence for autologous fat grafting by injection for defects arising from breast surgery, breast cancer treatment or prevention and congenital breast deformity. The new items are 45534 for unilateral autologous fat grafting, and 45535 for bilateral autologous fat grafting. The new item descriptors are on page 2 of this fact sheet.

Why are the changes being made?

The listing of these services was recommended by the Medical Services Advisory Committee (MSAC) in July 2020. Further details about MSAC applications can be found under [MSAC Applications](#) on the MSAC website ([Medical Services Advisory Committee](#)).

What does this mean for providers?

Providers will benefit from having access to two new MBS items for patients requiring autologous fat grafting specific for breast related services.

Please note that an additional new item 45589, for autologous fat grafting for the treatment of craniofacial defects and burns scars, will also commence on 1 November 2021

How will these changes affect patients?

Patients will receive Medicare rebates for clinically relevant autologous fat grafting services.

Who was consulted on the changes?

The following groups were consulted as part of the Medicare Services Advisory Committee (MSAC) process - Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, Australian Society of Plastic Surgeons, Reclaim Your Curves, Breast Cancer Network Australia, Australia and New Zealand Burn Association, Consumers Health Forum Australia, Royal Australasian College of Surgeons and General Surgeons Australia.

How will the changes be monitored and reviewed?

MBS items 45534 and 45535 will be subject to MBS compliance processes and activities, including random and targeted audits which may require a provider to submit evidence about the services claimed.
